**Absolutely Advent! 2025** provides reflections on the final three principles of Catholic social teaching and on the common good, the goal of Catholic social teaching. The common good calls for individuals and organizations to provide conditions so that everyone can fully and easily reach their fulfillment.

## What does Catholic social teaching have to do with Advent?

During Advent, we prepare for the coming of Jesus into this world—at the first Christmas, today, and at the end of time. This Incarnation means Jesus is both God and human. So the principles of Catholic social teaching once affected Jesus as they affect us. He was created in the image and likeness of God; he was born into the family of Joseph and Mary; he lived among the poor and vulnerable; he worked (probably as a carpenter); he saw himself in solidarity with everyone on Earth; and he cared for creation. As both God and human, Jesus shared a vision for the common good that we strive to reach in our world today.

Over these next four weeks, we will look at how we are preparing this world for Jesus. How are we caring for one another—especially the poor and vulnerable—and for God's creation? **Absolutely Advent!** can help. Each day you will:

- Read a Scripture passage from the readings of the day.
- Reflect on each passage with journal questions.
- Engage in activities that make the Scripture come alive.
- Consider teachings of our popes and bishops.
- Reflect on how to put Catholic social teaching into action.

The season of Advent includes four Sundays. Beginning today, you are invited to spend the next four weeks reflecting on your faith in God and the Church. But you will also be challenged to put that faith into action by engaging in activities that, in small, simple ways, will help to create a better world. It's time to live your faith with **Absolutely Advent!**

DECEMBER 4 ★ SAINT JOHN DAMASCENE

Those of steadfast mind you keep in peace—
in peace because they trust in you.
Trust in the Lord forever,
for in the Lord God
you have an everlasting rock.
For he has brought low
the inhabitants of the height;
the lofty city he lays low.
He lays it low to the ground,

« ISAIAH 26:3-6 »

## **Solidarity**

To sustain a lifestyle which excludes others, or to sustain enthusiasm for the selfish ideal, a globalization of indifference has developed. Almost without being aware of it, we end up being incapable of feeling compassion at the outcry of the poor, weeping for other people's pain, and feeling a need to help them, as though all this were someone else's responsibility and not our own. The culture of prosperity deadens us; we are thrilled if the market offers us something new to purchase. In the meantime all those lives stunted for lack of opportunity seem a mere spectacle; they fail to move us.

We have to move from our devotion to independence, through an understanding of interdependence, to a commitment to human solidarity. That challenge must find its realization in the kind of community we build among us. Love implies concern for all—especially the poor—and a continued search for those social and economic structures that permit everyone to share in a community that is a part of a redeemed creation (Rom 8:21-23).

**"AM I MY BROTHER'S KEEPER?"** That was Cain's response when God asked Cain where his brother Abel was. The question "Am I my brother's keeper?" is still asked today. The principle of Solidarity extends the question beyond our brothers and sisters to our neighbors and to people all around the world. That means paying attention to what is happening to people not only in our own backyards and neighborhoods, but in all areas of the world.

Thomas Merton, a Trappist monk and a very influential Catholic writer, wrote a book titled, No Man Is an Island. Referring to a quote by John Donne, the title of the book expresses the point of the Catholic social teaching on Solidarity. No person is an island. We are all connected to one another, and our connections to others are not limited to our friends and family. Each of us is connected to all of humanity, even to those who are halfway around the world. Are you your brother's or sister's keeper? You bet you are! We are one body—the Body of Christ!



# Second Friday of Advent DECEMBER 12 ★ OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." « LUKE 1:30-32 »

On December 12, 1531, Mary appeared as Our Lady of Guadalupe to Juan Diego, one of the poor and oppressed native people of Mexico. She spoke to him in Nahuatl, the language of his people, and told him to ask the bishop to build a church in the place of her appearance. When the bishop asked for proof of this request, Mary sent Juan Diego to the bishop with roses, an uncommon sight in the month of December.

An angel announced the coming of Jesus; a poor and humble man carried Mary's message to a bishop. Both were messengers chosen to carry God's word.

DECEMBER 23 ★ SAINT JOHN OF KANTY
